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Ryan's Reflections

Recently I came across a true story illustrating the influence of a Godly mother:

It was 1950, and Susannah Prentice lived in Maine with her husband Miles and their three children, Annie, James and John. The family were all Christians except for John, the youngest son. He attended church with the family but was skeptical about faith and prayer.

Miles Prentice was a lobster fisherman. He was barely able to catch enough lobster to support his family. Even though storms were approaching, Miles decided he had no choice but to go check his lobster traps, hoping to catch enough to pay the electric bill, due the next day.

Miles and his oldest son, James, headed out to sea on their small lobster fishing boat. As the storm raged, Miles and his son fought hard to keep their boat afloat. They ended up being carried out to sea. And when the storm finally passed, Miles and James were in trouble. It was dark now. The clouds in the sky meant there were no stars for navigation.

Meanwhile, back at their two-story home, Susannah knew that her husband and son would not be able to find their way back home. So, she took a lamp and put it in the attic window, hoping its rays would serve as a beacon to direct them safely home. Her unsaved son, John, said, "It won't do any good!" Nevertheless, Susannah kept the lamp lit.

Out on the sea and in the darkness, James saw a faint light in the distance. He pointed it out to his father. "We'll steer for that!" said Miles. And slowly they made their way toward the light and shore. Seeing the light in the window, and assisted by Susannah's prayers, Miles and James were soon safely ashore. The family hugged each other in a happy celebration.

John asked, "How did you make it back in?" And James said, "We steered by the light mother put in the window, but we didn't know what was out there." To himself, the unsaved son John thought, "Maybe it is time for me to steer my life by mother's light." Susannah Prentice not only put a light in the attic window, but she also let her light shine in front of her family.

A few months later, the unsaved son John became ill. The doctor examined the young man. And then he gave them the grim prognosis, "He won't live long." As death approached, the young man said, "Don't be afraid for me. I will make it to the safety of the heavenly harbor, because I have steered by mother's light and have found the Savior, Jesus Christ."

May we never discount the impact of a Godly mother's example, prayers, and love.

When we speak the name of Jesus over our families we are declaring that we will bring HIS love, HIS holiness and HIS influence into our homes.


JESUS.....YOUR NAME IS POWER!

From the Chairman's Desk

On March 23, 2025, at 12:41 pm, Channing and I welcomed our second son into the world, Thomas Asher Warren. Prior to Asher's arrival, we had to make the drive to Greensboro Women's Hospital. During the ride there, as Channing experienced a contraction, I could hear her breathing as she tried to control the pain which in turn resulted in my foot steadily increasing pressure on the accelerator. Though we were ecstatic about meeting Asher, we knew the pain that Channing would have to go through to deliver him. I knew that I would have to be her watchful supporter and encourager as she experienced labor for the second time. Ultimately, what pressed her forward in this process was that guarantee that at its conclusion, she would meet this "new life."

Having gone through this miracle a second time, I could not help but think about Genesis 3:16, in which Moses writes how God rendered judgment, "To the woman He said, 'I will make your pains in childbearing very severe; with painful labor you will birth to children..." I've often asked myself, why was this specific judgment ascribed to women? Why does extreme pain have to be experienced so that a new life can be welcomed? In Genesis 3:17, Adam is told that he and his seed will have to toil the ground to produce food from it; however, this food which guarantees continued survival, does not bring new life.

In thinking about this passage, I cannot help but think about the crucifixion. Certainly, based on our knowledge of the Roman's methods, Jesus experienced more pain and suffering than we can imagine. However, the suffering He experienced produced new life as He was resurrected. Not only did He become a "new creature", but He also made it possible for us to become new creatures! As Jesus hangs upon the cross, He quotes Psalm 22, saying "My God, My God, why have you forsaken me?" Though we have been taught that this cry was due to the Father turning away, but Jesus is using His dying breaths to teach a lesson about who He is and what He is doing. He is quoting only a part of the Psalm because the surrounding Jews, especially any rabbis present, knew the end of the Psalm read, "They shall come, and shall declare his [God's] righteousness unto a people that shall be born, that he hath done this." The only righteous man who could stand in the presence of the Father, experienced tremendous pain and suffering so that He could stand in our place before the Father, justifying us under His law.

As I've previously written, God uses His creation as a tool to teach us who He is. If we are good students of His Word, we can readily see Him in our application of the text to our lives. So, in thinking about Genesis 3:16, we see that early in His story, God was teaching His creation that through pain and suffering, new life will come. God knew that He would send His son to redeem and repair the broken relationship with humanity; He knew that the Son would suffer; but He knew that through the Son's suffering and pain, new life would result. We become so excited, as we should, for babies to enter this world, so let us remember to get as excited to welcome a new life in the faith.
